






#### AFS, ACL & Auditor applications on-hand: 3 years








#### AFSL: June 19 to June 20 trend



#### ACL: June 19 to June 20 trend








#### AFSL performance: days taken to reach % decisions

AFSL - FY 1920 vs FY 1819




#### ACL performance: days taken to reach % decisions

### Number of applications received in each of the last two financial years



Authorisation 3	MDA providers, remittance providers, margin lending providers	29	26
Authorisation 4	Market makers, responsible entities, traditional trustee companies, custodians, crowd sourced equity funders	72	54

#### **Stronger Regulator reforms**

- Fit and proper person tests
  - INFO 240 (AFSL) and INFO 244 (Australian credit licences)
  - Requirement to identify all persons that meet the definition of fit and proper persons
  - Requirement to provide sufficient information to enable us to be satisfied that the persons meet the fit and proper person test
- Deemed withdrawal of applications AFSL and Australian credit licences
- Requirement to commence operations within six months
- Other changes right to a hearing before a refusal of a variation application, false and misleading information, change in control

#### New licensee types

- Foreign financial services providers (RG 176)
  - One licence issued as at 1 December 2020
  - Need to make applications with ample time to allow decision and licence grant before 1 April 2022
- Funeral expenses facility operators (INFO 243)
  - No licences issued as at 1 December 2020
- Litigation funding schemes (information available <u>here</u>)
  - Four licences issued as at 1 December 2020
